1920 - 2025

TIMELINE

LMC's three year school programme of maritime studies complements the schools Maths, Science and language subjects and so young South Africans can once again finish their schooling with a nautical orientation and so follow careers of their choice hopefully in the community of seafaring – our proud heritage.



2025

In 1995 a group of passionate marine enthusiasts started the Lawhill Maritime Centre (LMC) linked to the Simon's Town School, so back to the roots from which the ship was once moored.

2005 Cape Technikon changes to Cape Peninsula University of Technology.

1990 SAMNA *General Botha* handed over to Cape Technikon.



1966

In March 1966 cadets from the SANC *General Botha* moved from Gordons Bay to a new building in Mouille Point (Granger Bay) and became an Academy (SAMNA).

1948

April 1948 cadets of the *General Botha* move to crash boat station in Gordons Bay.



1940

During World War 2 May 1940 cadets depart Ship – *General Botha* – for the sport field Redhill above Simon's Town.

1922

1922 - first cadets join the ship at anchor in Simon's Town close to dockyard. The ship, named after the Union's first Prime Minister, *General Botha*, was anchored in the protected waters of Simon's Town where about 150 cadets would undergo both navigation and seamanship education but also **discipline and Honour and Duty – the motto of the Old Boys' Association.**



1920

1920 - Mr TBF Davis donated an ex World War 1 cruiser - H.M.S. Thames to South Africa for the sole purpose to train young men for a career at sea in nautical training.

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OVERVIEW

MISSION

The S.A.T.S *General Botha* Old Boy's Association Bursary Fund (GBOBA BF) was initiated in April 2011 by Phil Wade after a visit by four S.A.T.S *General Botha* Old Boys Association (GBOBA) reunion groups, from the years 1951, 1961, 1971 and 1981, to the Lawhill Maritime Centre (LMC) at Simon's Town School. Lawhill so impressed the participants as being similar to the *General Botha* in its years as a training ship, a nautical college and an academy that it was decided that it would be valuable and appropriate to establish a bursary fund with the following fourfold mission:

- The preservation of the S.A.T.S *General Botha* culture and legacy as a significant part of South African maritime history.
- The maintenance of a living memorial honouring the memory of *General Botha* Old Boys.
- The encouragement and education of young South Africans to pursue careers in the maritime industry.
- The strengthening of national maritime education and training initiatives.

The Fund was created under the auspices of the Cape Town Branch of the S.A.T.S *General Botha* Old Boys Association. The Fund has the following statement of objectives in its constitution: ►



PRINCIPAL OBJECTIVES

The principal objective of the Fund is to assist students financially who wish to enter, or who already attend, an approved educational establishment to study towards a maritime career;

being students studying, or wishing to study, at the Lawhill department of maritime studies in the Simon's Town School, or similar school, and those studying, or wishing to study at tertiary institutions to qualify for admittance to the Navigation and/or Engineering Cadet Programme.

Alternatively, should it be found by the governing body of the Fund that they cannot satisfy this principal objective for any reason, they can decide to support materially an approved institution that provides maritime education and/or training.

An important supplementary objective to the principal objective of the Fund is to provide a successful mentoring and outreach programme for all its funded students.

CONSTITUTION

The original constitution was finalized and approved by the South African Revenue Services (SARS) in October 2011, establishing the Fund as a Public Benefit Organisation with registration for tax exemption and allowance for the issue of certificates for donor taxation benefits.

The original constitution was amended during 2017 to allow for the incorporation of the Society of Master Mariners Bursary Fund. It was further amended in 2020.

The constitution is available to any interested parties on request.

TAX BENEFITS FOR DONORS

Donors subject to tax in South Africa can benefit by contributing to this fund as follows:

Individuals: Limited to a donation benefit of 10% of taxable income before the deduction of donations and medical expenses.

Companies: Limited to a donation benefit of 10% of taxable income before becoming liable for taxation on donations.

BBBEE: As defined by the Codes of Good Practice 100% of beneficiaries are black South Africans. (Independent Confirmation Report available on request.)

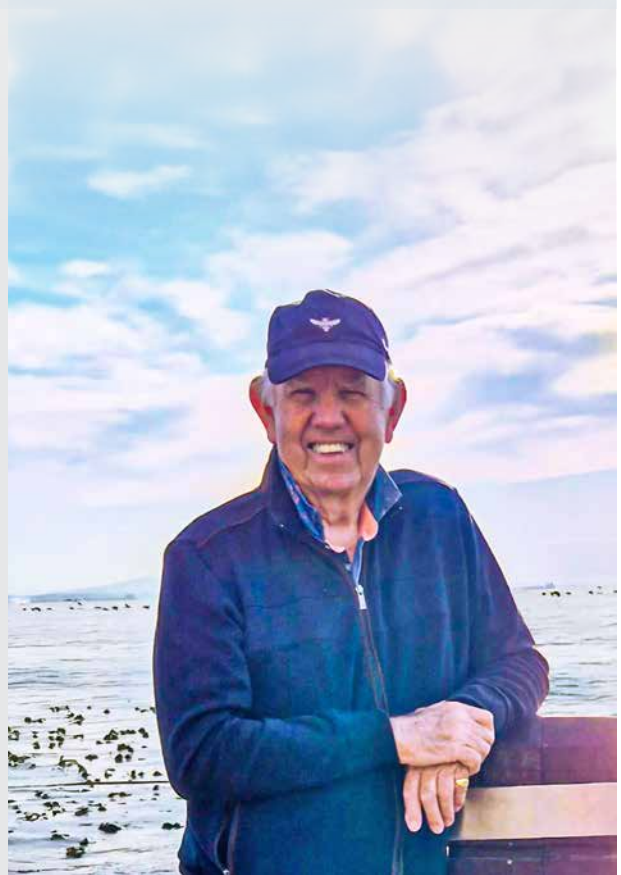
We are delighted to report that the five 2025 matriculants from LMC performed commendably, four achieving bachelor level passes and they have moved into tertiary education.

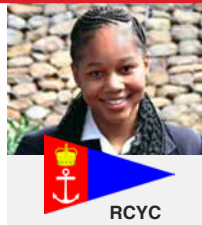

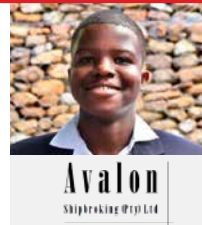

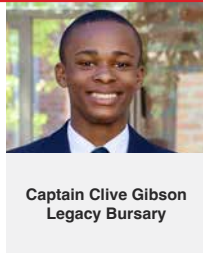

LMC MENTORING AND OUTREACH

“Nurturing Sea Fever”

The Bursary Fund considers mentoring and outreach a crucial initiative, empowering our youth to reach their highest potential through Mentorship, Literacy, Education, and Community Collaboration.

Through such guidance and motivation, we see our scholars embrace our training ship's motto; Honour and Duty, leading them to become mature, responsible leaders in society and their chosen careers.

Besides regular meetings and interaction with our scholars we place much emphasis on exposure to the maritime industry. Field outings are a valuable tool enabling our scholars to make informed decisions on their future studies and careers.

We started the year with a tour of the recently opened submarine museum in Simon's Town, the SAS Assegaai. The tour, led by past submariners themselves, left our scholars enthralled, questions were raised of available careers in the S.A. Navy. The group were in awe of the tiny galley on board the submarine which catered for fifty crew around the clock.



Prior to the submarine tour time was used to discuss preparation for study opportunities after school and drafting a CV.

One is unable to rewrite history but one can learn from history. An annual fixture on the calendar is the Association's War Memorial Service at which former cadets of the South African Training Ship *General Botha* who lost their lives in World War II and other conflicts in the service of their country and liberation, are honoured. Our scholars embrace the history and legacy of those who have gone before them. The Lawhill Maritime Centre choir rendered a tear-jerking rendition of a WWII era farewell song.



Visits to industry are equally important, exposing our scholars to the boardroom as well as operations that form the basis of a successful company. Hosted by FPT in Table Bay Harbour the level of questions asked during the boardroom presentation was indicative of the intense interest our budding ship masters, chief engineers and chief executive officers show in the maritime industry. A bonus of the field trip was a close-up view of large merchant ships and the shore infrastructure that supports them.

A new career avenue for our scholars was the highlight of the year; hosted by Wreckless Marine, a private company established to facilitate ocean exploration and increase the knowledge of what lies beneath the seas. Treated to a demonstration trip out in False Bay on their flagship, *Wreckless II*, included a sonar view of a local wreck. The budding engineers among our scholars showed much interest in what was below decks in the engine compartment.



An added incentive for our scholars was to meet one of our bursary fund alumni, Jordan Heyburgh.

Jordan matriculated in 2024 and found employment with Blue Flash; he has subsequently become a qualified diver and a Category C Skipper (power craft). Living proof of what can be achieved through hard work and dedication.

SAIL AND MOTORBOAT PROGRAMME

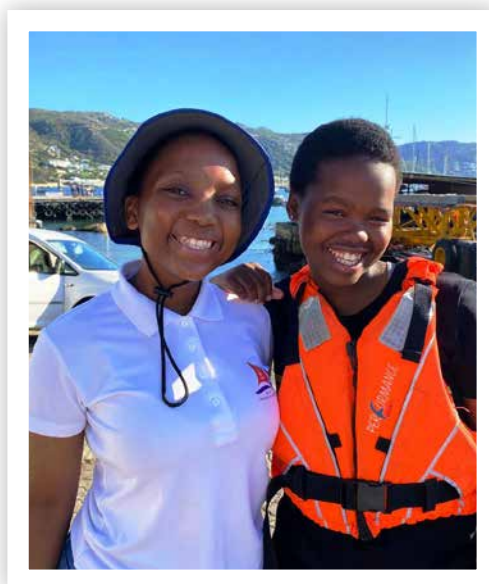


Nikki Berry has been appointed to manage this ever-growing programme taking over the helm from stalwart volunteer Blackie Swart.

SWIMMING AND PRE SEA TRAINING AND OPEN DAY

The beginning of 2025 saw 24 LMC Grade 10's take part in the Learn to Swim Programme, the largest group to which the Bursary Fund has provided this life changing opportunity. Eighteen of these learners were then selected to complete the NSRI presea practical training exercise and thereafter attend an Open Day at False Bay Yacht Club to expose them to yacht *Homero* and motorboat *Sean Day* before they started their weekend training. For these teens this opens the doors to transformative experiences.



SAIL TRAINING

HOMERO | NIKKI BERRY

“A smooth sea never made a skilled sailor”

(often attributed to Franklin D. Roosevelt) sums up 2025.

Nikki took over the care of *Homero* and the sailing programme in late January.

Sail training happened on most Saturdays in term time. The new Grade 10's had many 'sail training' days of no wind, which proved to be very productive in teaching them how to operate the motor and to steer without the added detail of having the sails up.



An exciting aspect to 2025 was having Misokuhle Langa and Anika Mtyelwa (OOW cadets at SAMTRA at the time) join the team as skippers. The learners very much enjoyed having them on board to show them the ropes and it is wonderful that they were able to give back to the programme that they benefitted so much from while they were at LMC.



Eight buoyancy aids were purchased to improve water safety with the rule implemented that they must always be worn onboard. Part of this risk assessment prompted design of a 'self-rescue' boarding ladder which has been fitted to the stern.

In April six Grade 12's completed their Competent Crew and wrote their Day Skippers exam and were later awarded their SAS Day Skipper tickets and **in November five Grade 11's wrote their SRC** (VHF radio exams) in preparation for completing their Day Skippers in 2026.

MOTOR BOAT TRAINING

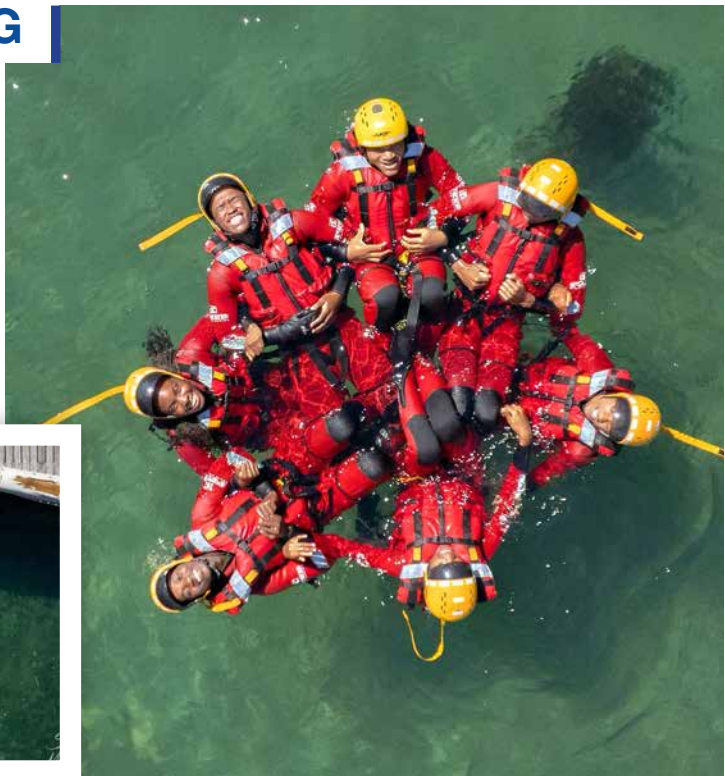

TERTIARY STUDENTS

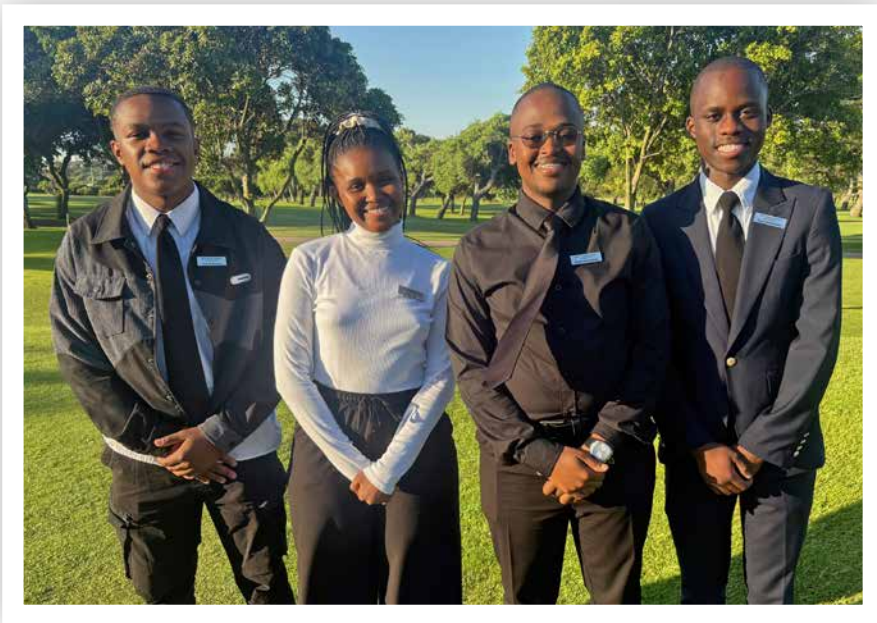

Our six students at their respective universities in Durban and Cape Town excelled in their studies and their extramural activities. We are grateful to our sponsors and supporting volunteers who make it possible for these youngsters to apply themselves diligently to the task in hand, meeting the challenges of university life.

We are immensely proud of our graduate this year, Mr Sbonga Sibiyi from Durban University of Technology (DUT) with a Diploma Nautical Studies (NQF: 6) obtaining nine distinctions. He will now go on into the next challenging stage in the maritime world, finding employment as a Deck Cadet where he is required to complete 12 months of practical experience to qualify as a competent Officer of the Watch.

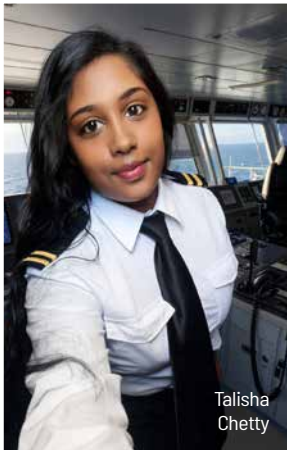


Also at DUT was Ms Simnikiwe Vundla in her second year studying for a 3-year Nautical Diploma.

While at Cape Town University of Technology (CPUT) we had two in their second year of Marine Engineering, one in first year of Marine Engineering and one student studying Nautical Science (Deck) first year. All have excelled in most subjects, and we have been very proud of their achievements.

The Bursary Fund continues to endeavour to guide and support our youngsters, who have come through a maritime education from Grade 10, matriculation and on into tertiary studies, in achieving their career choice at sea as a Navigator or Engineering Officer and ultimately management level as Captain or Chief Engineer. This may only be accomplished with the generous support of local and international ship owners, operators, employment agencies and related industry.

PAST STUDENTS STORIES



Talisha Chetty

Talisha Chetty was funded by the Bursary Fund at LMC in 2015 and now a 2nd Officer with Wagenborg.

"My journey at sea has been both challenging and rewarding. As a woman in a male-dominated industry, I've learned to build resilience and confidence in my abilities. Reaching a second officer rank is something I'm proud of, and I value representing women in this space.

Balancing married life with a seafaring career is a new challenge, but it has strengthened my appreciation for communication, trust, and time together. I am proud of how far I've come and look forward to continuing to grow."

Avela May from Mitchell's Plain in Cape Town was introduced to the GBOBA Bursary Fund in 2016. He is now 3rd Officer with Alfa Shipping.

"Thanks to the Bursary Fund, from Grades 10 to 12 I took part in NSRI training, TS Woltemade camps (the camps enforced discipline), ship visits and job shadowing opportunities at maritime job-related companies. These experiences laid the foundation for what would become a promising future for a young man in the seafaring industry.

After completing high school, I decided that I would study Navigation in 2019, with the assistance of the Bursary Fund yet again, I studied S1 & S2 at SSTG in Cape Town and after completing my Officer of the Watch (OOW) course I joined my first ship in 2020 as a Deck Cadet. Thereafter I completed my cadetship at Grindrod Shipping where I had the privilege of sailing with an Old Salt, Capt. Mike Melly.

In 2023, again with the assistance of the Bursary Fund, I went CPUT to complete my S3 and S4 and I also passed OOW CLASS 3 oral exam thanks to Captains' Dennis Henwood and Simon Pearson's assistance with my oral preparations. I am currently serving as 3rd Navigating Officer on Bulk Carrier on a worldwide trade for a German company.

One thing I have learnt over the years is that because of the foundation that was laid in high school, I have been able to continuously persevere and always strive to keep flying the South African Flag. I would not have made it this far without the assistance of the Bursary Fund, including all the mentoring for which I'm truly grateful. "



Anele May (yes Avela's brother) – was funded through the Bursary Fund for his three years at LMC and his tertiary studies at SAMTRA.

"Joining my first vessel as a Junior Officer was nothing short of a rollercoaster but it was indeed a memorable experience. I flew from Cape Town to Australia and after many connecting flights, I finally arrived and joined the ship via Helicopter (talk about arriving in style). What a wonderful feeling it was to join a vessel again and be back at sea.

As Junior Officer I stand navigational watches as well as cargo watches in port under supervision of the Chief Mate. I also work with the 3rd Officer in maintaining all LSA And FFE equipment or any other job the Master or Chief requires me to do. I have settled well; and have good support from the Bridge Team.

Overall, to have had this dream in Grade 10 and to see it become a reality, slowly but surely, is a blessing. I truly thank General Botha Old Boys Association Bursary Fund, MACS Shipping, MUR Shipping, Lawhill Maritime Centre, and everyone who mentored, trained, inspired and believed in me."

FAIRSHIP SA MARINE BURSARY GOLF DAY

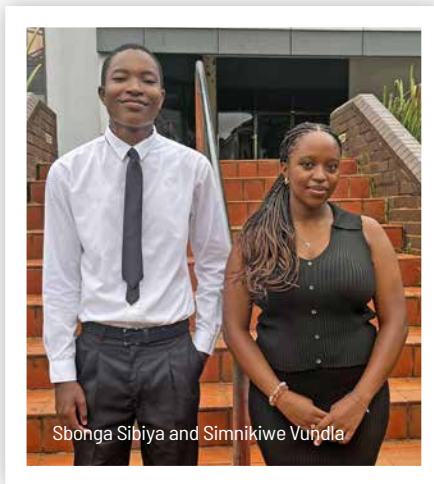
